# **Exploring Reggio Emilia**

This month Debbie and I (Anna) have had the privilege of attending the Reggio Emilia Australia Conference, held at the exhibition Centre, Melbourne. The convention was held over two and half days and consisted of lectures, key note presentations, a panel discussion and interactive classes.

Over the past few years, Cire has been working towards aligning our services and our approaches with that similar to the Reggio Emilia approach. Educational approaches are not commonly spoke about in everyday households; so, I will

give a brief overview of some of the principles of this approach and why we as educators, managers and teachers feel so strongly about this approach.

<u>Image of the child</u>- Children are seen as capable. They are not something to be filled with knowledge, but something to be unfolded as they are born capable and curious.

<u>100 languages</u>- There is not one right way for children to express their thoughts and idea but figuratively hundreds. Languages may include poem writing, drawing, dancing, modelling, collage, singing, acting, story writing and so forth.



The role of the First, Second and Third Teachers- This principle is largely about acknowledging that a child's parents are their First Teachers. (Did you know the Reggio Emilia approach was created by a group of parents and teachers trying to rebuild after world war II?) The role of the Educator (or Second Teacher) is to be a co – learner, learning with the children and helping carry out their research and what the children want to achieve. The Third Teacher being the environment or the classroom. This is why it is important to create inviting spaces for children to explore. It is important that all the teachers work together.

<u>Project inquiry and play based</u> -The learning that takes place in Reggio Emilia schools and Infant toddler centres is play based. This means that children learn through play and by investigating and exploring items and concepts that exist in their learning environments. Project work is a big part of everyday life in a Reggio classroom. Project work is based on concepts and ideas rather than item and themes. It is a group effort, with all children using different languages to become involved in the common project, or watching from the outskirts developing their knowledge at their own pace. The Project is not about finding the correct answer but the process used to along the way. Projects can continue for weeks, months and even years. The teachers and educators document the children's voices and collect samples and evidence of other learnings. At the end of the project a celebration is normally held exhibiting the children's findings along the way.

#### What's happening in the Kookaburra Room?

Exciting news! The Kinder Room have recommenced their KinderGarden program on a Friday. This program allows for each child to venture down to our veggie patch each fortnight. We were very excited to see what had been happening in the garden while we have been away and did some work to make it clear and safe again. The children helped to put clippings into the compost bins as we pruned some of the plants and we even found some little potatoes left behind from last year.

We also thought about the many ways we can keep ourselves, others, plants and even insects safe while we were in the garden. Everyone was so respectful as they explored the environment.

We are so excited to be doing this again and look forward to seeing what we can grow! Watch this space...









The Kookaburra room have also been focusing on lots of numeracy


We emerged the children with things to count, sort, group and just experiment with. We also included stories and games on the numeracy topic which the children really enjoyed.

### What's happening in the Wombat Room?

Over the past few months we have continued our investigation into movement. The Wombat

room children always have a strong view of nature, so this is often the lenses we approach our learning subjects with.

We have been looking at how insects move. We have looked specifically how Bees, worms, Crickets, beetles and butterfly's move.

We played many games where children are to act various movements out with their own bodies, studied worms in our outdoor environment and recently you may have seen the construction of our very own butterfly wings.



Celebrations this month have included winter solstice. For this the children have been discovering winter! We have enjoyed making paper lanterns to light the darkest day of the year and played with ice and water in our sensory tubs as we spoke and looked at images of winter.



We are working with the children to develop their emotional regulation skills. Within the room we currently have an emotional basketball area; with balls with different faces, books about emotions and a mirror to support them in labelling their emotions. Before children learn to regulate their emotions they first have be able to recognise their own emotions and identify them in others. To help the children build their emotional regulation skills we ask that families spend time with their children talking about emotions and helping children to not only identify their emotions but, emotions you may be

feeling as parents and guardians. Thank you to the families who have brought in family photos for our family tree. If you haven't already, please bring one in so we can add it to the

tree. You can bring it in as a hard copy or email us a copy.

Also, just a reminder to bring your children's wet weather gear as we are still going outside on cold and rainy days. Gumboots, warm rain coats and spare changes of pants, shirts, socks and jumpers would be apricated. From your Wombat team!

#### What's happening in the Koala Room?

Hi everyone!

The past few months we have been exploring lots of sensory experiences. We extended the children's interest of farm animals by making an edible mud with chia seeds, and food colouring. We also hide the animals in the sand and the children used their hands and shovel to dig, scoop and pour the sand to find the animals. We then made each animal sound when we found the animals. This activity supports the children's gross motor skills, while learning about the animal sounds.

In addition to exploring sensory experiences, we are also doing different styles of painting using nature. We have used gum nuts, leaves and sticks so far. We will

continue to explore more different nature materials for our arts.

We also added a bridge in the Koala room to encourage the children to confidently balance their body when standing.

As the weather is becoming colder please remember to bring your child's coat or jacket and ensure it is clearly labelled. Thank you so much.


I'm currently studying my certificate 3 in early childhood education and care.

Friendly reminder that Inspiro Dental Screening will be visiting us on Tuesday the  $18^{th}$  of July and Wednesday the  $19^{th}$  of July.

The screening will be performed by an Inspiro dental clinician and dental assistant and is a basic, non-invasive procedure used to identify oral conditions that may need further investigation.

It involves the dentist taking a quick look inside the child's mouth with basic dental tools such as a mouth mirror, probe and dental tweezers. If a child is concerned about any of these tools, the tool(s) will not be used during the screening. We are also offering a free fluoride treatment which involves a cream applied to the teeth.

At the completion of the screening, your child will be given a dental screening report (and a show bag) advising of any recommended examinations or treatments for future follow up by parents.

Please ensure you have returned your consent form if you wish for your child to participate.
